

Top tips for integrating trainee Education Mental **Health Practitioners** (EMHPs) into your school or college

Reflections and advice from former trainee EMHPs and host education settings on how to conduct an effective induction and placement experience

The importance of effectively integrating trainee EMHPs into your school/college

Independent **research**, cross-government **intelligence** and the experiences of **health and education partners** within the MHST service collectively highlight the **importance of effectively inducting and integrating trainee Education Mental Health Practitioners (EMHPs)** into placement education settings.

As a host school or college, you will receive early access to the MHST, helping you to proactively embed the service into your education setting. To get the best out of this arrangement, it is crucial your education setting provides practical support to trainee members of the MHST workforce (EMHPs) to help them meet their learning requirements and gain the necessary experience to become qualified and effectively support your setting.

A supportive, rigorous induction is vital for an effective placement experience that embeds the trainee into your school or college. It enables the trainee EMHP to understand various school/college contexts quicker, build better relationships with education staff and students, and work closely with you to assess, shape and improve your whole school or college approach to mental health and wellbeing to reflect and meet the needs of your community. Effective inductions can also encourage the retention of skilled staff within the MHST team and prevent delays to MHST service delivery.

Alongside the core information and checklists of actions outlined in the **EMHP placement pack**, this bitesize resource has been created for placement schools and colleges to offer **top tips**, **reflections and advice** from former trainee EMHPs and hosts on how to effectively induct and integrate EMHPs into your placement setting.

What does a good placement experience look like?

EMHP trainees are taught, understand and agree to follow the school's safeguarding pathways and procedures (incl. use of the school's safeguarding systems)

A rigorous induction for the EMHP trainee. This should include a premises orientation, allocation of intervention spaces and introductions to key staff and existing support for pupils (incl. mental health and health and safety procedures)

Regular communication with the school community regarding the trainee EMHP role, remit and training requirements Opportunities for the EMHP

Opportunities for the trainee to deliver a range of evidence-based group and individual interventions to children and young people with mild-moderate mental health needs and/or their parents and carers, tailored to the needs of each setting

Opportunities for the trainee EMHP to conduct an assessment of a child or young person's mental health needs

Education settings understand the types of pupils the trainee needs to work with, and agree referral pathways within the school/college setting (incl. whether self-referrals by CYP or families are possible)

Advice for new placement settings from EMHPs

Listen to Susie share the importance of a school tour, meeting staff, access to key resources and being signposted to students

What did the school do to help the you to settle in?

Listen to Carly share the importance of time with the senior mental health lead, regular communication, and opportunities to learn about the school context

What made a difference to helping you build relationships and making you feel part of the school community?

Listen to Sophie share the importance of dedicated space, being flexible and working together on the whole school or college approach

Advice for new placement settings from former placement schools

Listen to Blaise High School's top tips:

- ✓ Provide a strong understanding of the school safeguarding and pastoral support offer
- ✓ Introduce trainees to vulnerable children and young people alongside a trusted adult
 - √ Allocate a welcoming, quiet space
 - ✓ Dedicate time for staff introductions and regular check ins
 - Ensure school staff understand the role of interventions and the referrals criteria

Listen to Coombe Girls' School top tips:

- Welcome trainees with a pre-brief and Q&A on the school environment and referrals
- ✓ Signpost and provide face to face meetings with all key teaching, pastoral and admin staff
 - ✓ Communicate frequently and openly
- √ Tour the school and jointly agree room space
 - ✓ Ensure trainees are clear on the pastoral structure and process for all year groups
 - ✓ Respond quickly to any queries
